





Algoma continues to grow our fleet with the acquisition of two additional product tankers.

Results of the 5-Year Seaway Extension Program

The numbers are in! This year was the final year of a five-year pilot program extending the Welland Canal season one additional week into January. We'd like to highlight how this extension has proven to be beneficial not only for our customers but also for our environment by moving more cargo via the greenest mode of transportation.

Since the pilot program launched in 2020, Algoma has transported an additional 878,824 metric tons (MT) of cargo through the Welland Canal during January. We moved another 66,296 MT during the additional 4-day Seaway (MLO) extension this year, so that's 945,120 metric tons of additional cargo on one of the most sustainable and dependable supply chains in North America.

2024 marked the end of the 5-year Seaway extension pilot program.

If transported on our roadways, it would have taken approximately 31,500 trucks to carry the same amount as 18 vessels did in 42 trips.

This represents a substantial increase in the volume of essential goods sustainably delivered to local and global communities. It makes so much sense to maximize the use of our vital waterways. Thank you to the US and Canadian Seaways. We are all looking forward to the next 5 years of continued progress.

Algoma Transport Officially Retires

On January 8th, 2024, the *Algoma Transport*, built in 1979, was officially decommissioned and sent to be responsibly recycled in Port Colborne. During her time with Algoma, initially through our previous joint venture Seaway Bulk Carriers in 2004, and later as entirely Algoma's from 2011 onwards, she transported



nearly 200,000,000 metric tonnes (MT) of cargo across our vital bi-national waterways.

We have retired a number of older vessels in recent years, such as the *Algoma Transport*, as Algoma continues on its fleet renewal journey. A heartfelt appreciation goes out to the Captains, Chiefs, and crew members who dedicated their time onboard the Transport.

Algoma Vessels Triple Crown for the New Shipping Season!

March 22nd, 2024 began bright and early for both attending shoreside staff and the dedicated crew aboard the *Algoma Conveyor*, as she was the Top Hat vessel at Lock 8 in Port Colborne, Ontario. Algoma has many ties to Port Colborne and as Gregg Ruhl, President & CEO noted in his speech that morning, the connection may be deeper than we originally thought. After a careful investigation, our researchers suggest that Algoma and Port Colborne might be long-lost biological siblings, particularly since it was uncovered that Port Colborne's mascot is a blue bear!











However, the morning did not end at Lock 8! In fact, Gregg and Hannah Bowlby, Corporate Communications Manager, had to rush over to Lock 3 after the ceremony, where the *Algoma Sault* was officially commencing this navigation season. The event unfolded with a series of speeches from various industry and political stakeholders, including remarks from our CEO Gregg.

Amidst the speeches, representatives of the St. Lawrence Seaway stepped forward to formally announce the renewal of a 20-year Management Operations and Maintenance Agreement between them and both the Canadian and American government. This agreement, they emphasized, would ensure the continued reliability and efficiency of the Seaway for domestic and international shipping. After this

pivotal announcement, Gregg was honoured with an award from the Niagara Region and City of St. Catharines, recognizing and congratulating the company on its 125th anniversary. Reflecting on this milestone, Gregg expressed gratitude for the recognition and reiterated the company's unwavering commitment to providing reliable shipping solutions. It is not every day that a company celebrates 125 years, and as we embark on our this anniversary, our

commitment remains steadfast in transporting essential goods in the most environmentally sustainable way across the Great Lakes region and around the world.

Finally, the celebrations and crownings of Algoma vessels (and Captains) concluded on March 28th with the *NACC Argonaut* and Captain Glenn Powell, as the opening vessel and Captain for the Port of Oshawa! "Today, we are reminded of the importance of our strong 8-years young partnership with Nova Marine Carriers and the continued prospect for future opportunity and growth." said Gregg Ruhl, President & CEO of Algoma Central.














What was Algoma up to this Winter? We Were Training at Georgian Marine College!
