Employee Spotlight: Meet Captain Buckmaster

Captain Buckmaster grew up in a small fishing community in Newfoundland. Whether it was fishing for cod, hunting for birds, or simply taking in Newfoundland's beautiful coast line, water has always surrounded him, and from 10 years old, he knew his career would be in the marine industry.





Curtis' career began at 22 after he completed the Nautical Science program at the Marine Institute. His goal was to become a captain by 30 and in order to do this, he had to spend much of his 20's away from home. "I spent the first couple years of my career in the Canadian Arctic and on the east coast of Canada as a Watchkeeping Mate, 3rd Mate, and 2nd Mate, completing as much sea time as possible." By the time he was 24, he had acquired a Chief Officer unlimited certification, and had visited over 17 countries across South America, the Mediterranean, North Sea, and more. At this age, "it was difficult being in charge of people who had 20-30 years of experience on me. However, you grow up fast when you're in charge of 8-10 crew and responsible for the safe loading, stowage, and discharging of 20 million litres of petroleum product.

During that time, I learned some of my greatest life lessons that have made me the person I am today". Incredibly, Curtis achieved the goal he had set for himself, starting on board training as a captain by 30 and taking command of his very first ship by 31!

Despite his success, it's not always smooth sailing for Buckmaster. The inherent characteristics

of working on water makes work life balance a real challenge as it is easy to feel disconnected from your family and friends due to the time away. He notes that the technology available today and on board definitely helps. The extended time off also allows him to do just about any outdoor activity imaginable with his wife, his son, and his dog. "There aren't too many jobs in the world which allows you 6 months of the year to dedicate to your family and doing the things you love. There is also no daily commute, your meals are served to you, you are well compensated, and most importantly, there is always fresh coffee being served."

If you are interested in working on board one of our vessels, here's what the Captain recommends, "Never give up. Set a goal and complete that goal. Don't be afraid to try new things. Life is short, so travel and experience the world. If you want to see the world, work in a profession where everyday has new scenery, you're financially compensated, and you have lots of time off to travel and enjoy life with the ones you love."

Why the *Algoterra* Is Docked: Understanding the Importance of Dry Docking

As part of the stringent SOLAS (Safety of Life at Sea) requirements, all merchant vessels must undergo a comprehensive survey of their hull in a dry dock at least twice within a five-year period. This includes a special survey and an intermediate survey, which must occur within



a maximum of 36 months. Recently, the *Algoterra* completed its third five-year docking in Portugal, ensuring it meets these essential safety standards.

Dry docking is crucial for the maintenance of a ship's hull, propeller, rudder, and other components that are submerged in water and generally inaccessible while the vessel is sailing. A dry dock is a specially designed area where the construction, repairs, and maintenance of merchant vessels are carried out. The unique design allows water to be filled or drained from the area, enabling vessels to be maneuvered in and out.

Once a vessel enters the dry dock and is positioned on blocks, the gates are closed, and the water is drained. This exposes the hull and other underwater parts of the ship, allowing for necessary maintenance and repair work.

Below are a few major jobs carried out on the Algoterra:

- Ballast water treatment system (BWTS) installation: Installation of the BWTS was not only one of the major projects during this docking but also successful in its installation and commissioning!
- Hull cleaning/ blasting and painting: The *Algoterra* hull paint was orange prior to this docking. The complete hull was cleaned, blasted using grit blasting, and painted in Algoma colours.
- Main engine overhauling: The complete main engine was overhauled during this docking, this was done as per makers standard maintenance schedule.
- Steering gear complete overhauling.
- Bow thruster complete overhauling.

The comprehensive docking project took about 40 days to complete. The *Algoterra* is now back home, serving on the Great Lakes - St. Lawrence Seaway with renewed efficiency and safety!

Algoma is now a truly international company, with significant investments in global short-sea and a growing position in international tankers. I have had the privilege of working with

some tremendous colleagues, all of whom are committed not just to Algoma's success, but to the success of everyone that works for Algoma. This has been a great place to work and I know that the Company is positioned for further success in the future." Peter Winkley, Chief Financial Officer.

Algoma is also announcing the appointment of Christopher Lazarz to the position of Chief Financial Officer, effective January 1, 2025. Christopher joined Algoma in 2011 having held a variety of finance positions of increasing responsibility and currently serves as Vice-President, Finance. Dave Belisle, Director of Vessel Performance Talks Biofuels on *The Drive* Newstalk

of sustainable shipping. Dave discusses the exciting potential of biofuel - a renewable energy source made from plant materials - and its ability to integrate into existing ship engines as a "drop-in" fuel.

With one vessel running on 100% biofuel (B100) for two summers and a total of five that have been tested, the performance results have been impressive. On October 18th, the Algoberta bunkered 170 MT of biofuel (B19), making her the first product tanker in our domestic fleet to bunker an alternative low carbon fuel.

Dave also highlights how biofuels can help bridge the gap to long-term decarbonization solutions and play a crucial role in the Green Shipping Corridor program (GSCP). Using the **grants awarded to Algoma** by the GSCP, Algoma and study partners have commenced technical and economic feasibility studies on alternative fuels, wind-assisted propulsion, shore power, a container tug-barge, and a next generation Laker design. The goal is to gauge the suitability of these technologies for bulk vessels in our trades in the Great Lakes - St. Lawrence region.


